
Ask an expert MARNANIE STYLE

Interior designer Charlotte Coote certainly knows a thing or two about creating your dream home. *House & Garden* was lucky enough to be invited to her annual masterclass at her property, Marnanie, in Mount Macedon.

Pretty in pink

- Charlotte's brave colour palette was inspired by the rhododendrons in the garden.
- Her father John made the original pink and white John Stefanidis curtains for Kevin O'Neill and John Graham, his friends and the previous owners of Marnanie. Charlotte restored them by removing the tattered edges and adding a new pink linen base band.

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- Charlotte painted the entire dining room in high gloss Resene Glamour Puss.
- She designed a custom copper and crystal chandelier, which was manufactured in London.

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Charlotte and her husband, Geordie, turned an unused garage into a dream kitchen dining space that opens onto a newly landscaped garden – an ideal design for the Mount Macedon setting. 


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- Charlotte injects colour with confidence. Choose a room colour first, then layer fabric, textures, furniture and finishes in complementary hues.
- She is a big fan of reviving vintage pieces with fresh upholstery in lovely patterned, plain or striped fabrics.
- Paint is transformative and a room can be reimagined with a bold colour choice.
- Make an unexpected room a hero, such as a powder room, with bespoke furniture and original artworks.







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Colour cues

- Layers of tonal blue infuse this serenely comfortable library with a soothing ambience. Here, Charlotte has worked with bold textures, tones and fabrics to create a supremely relaxing ambience and welcoming room.
- "You don't need to use a lot of colour in a room to make it interesting," explains Charlotte.
 "Using various shades of one colour can be very beautiful. Just try to ensure there is a good balance of lighter and darker elements."

- Low terracotta pots filled with masses of green and white plants are the perfect floral accompaniment to languid lunches alfresco.
